Anti-Poverty Initiatives in Merthyr Tydfil

Life has changed very much for many of us since the start of the pandemic in March 2020. While it has had a devastating impact on family life, relationships and mental health, it has also impacted on our economy. With furlough having come to an end, together with the additional uplift to Universal Credit, plus rising energy and food prices, more and more families and individuals face an austere winter ahead. This edition of Inform focuses on the initiatives which have developed in Merthyr Tydfil during the pandemic aimed at helping those who can least afford it.

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Welcome to the October edition of Inform in 2021. Our aim is to provide our members with up to date news and information and we welcome contributions and feedback from all readers.

Feeding Merthyr Tydfil – The Food Prosperity Network

Merthyr Tydfil Food Prosperity Network was established in 2018, following an approach by Oxfam Cymru, as a partnership approach to tackling food inequality, accessibility and affordability. It comprises third sector and statutory organisations working across Merthyr Tydfil with the aim of individually and collaboratively addressing and mitigating the impact of food poverty within the brough.

Originally, it delivered a range of co-ordinated messages put out on social media and other networks around the availability of support for example, Merthyr Valleys Homes' food hampers and school holiday activities, MTHA's Fit and Fed programme, Healthy Start vouchers, free school meals for children not already registered and the availability of the School Uniform Grant.

Take up of these services significantly increased as a result. In January 2020, the Welsh Local Government Association made funding available to Merthyr Tydfil County Borough Council to distribute in small grants to fund initiatives which tackled food inequality and bids were submitted amongst others by the three housing associations in Merthyr Tydfil for a network of community Fridges.

When Covid struck, the establishment of the Food Prosperity Network proved invaluable. So many community organisations repurposed themselves, becoming a key source of food for those who were in difficulty, whether shielding or in financial crisis. While this has changed and evolved over the last months, new initiatives continue to develop. The network itself has become a part of the Feeding Britain network, the only area in Wales to do so. Andrew Forsey from Feeding Britain said "Feeding Britain had the privilege of welcoming Merthyr Tydfil to our movement this year, as our first regional partnership in Wales.

"The Feeding Merthyr Tydfil programme has already begun to stitch together a robust safety net, consisting of new projects to support families and individuals on low incomes, including a fuel bank and a cluster of pantries offering affordable food at the heart of the communities we serve.

We look forward to adding to this programme in the months ahead and sharing this good practice throughout Feeding Britain's 35 regional partnerships, so we can tackle head on the issues that put people at risk of going hungry or having to rely on food banks. I look forward to our visit to Merthyr Tydfil in November"

Partnership Working for the future

In July 2021 Welsh Government announced £2m to address food sufficiency issues. Merthyr Tydfil County Borough Council, Merthyr Valleys Homes and Voluntary Action Merthyr Tydfil submitted a bid on behalf of the Network and £100,000 was awarded.

A range of capital and revenue allocations will be shared with community organisations and a pilot within a small number of schools and pre-school groups to engage children, young people, parents / carers, families and older people in a range of cooking and community growing activities and sessions.

An additional element of the bid is to undertake a piece of work to ensure food sufficiency work in the Borough is sustainable.

The aim of this funding is to:

- support community food organisations in the here and now to meet the needs of households living in food poverty.
- support communities to invest in initiatives that help tackle the root causes of food poverty and food insecurity and develop healthy, sustainable solutions which involve and engage our communities
- support an increased number of people facing food poverty by strengthening existing community food initiatives.

Councillor Chris Davies said: "The Council is delighted to receive this funding from Welsh Government to work with a number of partners to continue some of the great work started during the pandemic period and enable organisations across the borough to work with & support communities to increase their skills and knowledge in areas such as cooking on a budget for families along with developing a range of exciting growing initiatives. It is about winning over hearts and minds towards more sustainable solutions to tackling the food insecurity challenge facing our communities".





Hope Pantry

Research from Your Local Pantry, headed by Church Action on Poverty. has highlighted that the number of families seeking emergency food in the UK has increased by almost one third in the past 12 months, with some areas of the UK seeing as many as one in four people struggling to access food.

Food pantries are a growing way to address this issue, as a sustainable long term solution for those struggling with food insecurity, with customers able to shop without having to prove their level of need, and with no limit of time that people can use the pantry.

Hope Pantry Merthyr was set up in May 2021 as a response to food poverty in Merthyr Tydfil. Food pantries are designed to offer a membership model, whereby members pay £3.50 per week and in return are able to buy fresh, frozen, chilled and ambient foods that would cost at least £15. Our food is fresh, supermarket quality, sourced from Fareshare Cymru, and would have otherwise gone to waste. In addition, we always have a variety of fresh fruit and vegetables which are free to members. We link with Pet Food Bank based in Cardiff and are able to offer cat and dog food as part of the weekly allowance.

Hope Pantry is part of the Your Local Pantry national franchise, and we open on a Tuesday morning and a Friday afternoon. We are set up like a shop, and members tell us they enjoy coming to shop in Pantry, and value the choice of food on offer.

Members tell us that thanks to the savings they have made on their food shopping they've been able to begin paying off debts and household bills, something that they would otherwise be struggling with. We currently have 161 pantry members and are continuing to grow every week.

What is Hope Pantry?

• Merthyr Tydfil •

Pantry is a membership scheme where you pay a weekly donation of £3.50 and receive at least 10 items that would normally cost £10 or more. It's located at Hope Church Merthyr on High Street next to the Redhouse. Please use the side door on Newcastle Street to access.

Who is Pantry for

People who need to bring down their food shopping bills, and access good food, whilst freeing up more money for other essentials and enabling tight budgets to stretch a little further. It means that people can stay afloat in tough times, rather than being swept into debt.

How do I join Pantry?

What kind of food is there?

You will be able to choose from a selection of fresh, chilled, frozen and ambient food. From ready meals and fresh meat to tins and fresh fruit, each week there are different items to choose from. You will be able to choose at least 4 high price items and at least 6 lower priced items.

What else do I need to know?

- There are two Pantry days at Hope Pantry, a Tuesday from

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Focus on Anti-Poverty

Taff Bargoed Food Bank

Taff Bargoed Foodbank is also part of the Trussell Trust network, operated by the Parish of Treharris, Trelewis, Bedlinog & Llanfabon.

Set up at the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic with grant funding from various sources, to date we have supported over 1,584 with emergency food parcels on a referral basis from local support agencies and community professionals. We are currently able to offer delivery to all CF46 postcode areas if we have volunteers available, otherwise a collection service is always available. Our main distribution centre is based in Nelson, and we are planning on opening a new foodbank drop-off and collection point in Treharris, subject to grant funding.

What else are we doing?

Community Food Co-op

For a number of years, we have operated a community food co-operative which provides access to quality, fresh, local and affordable fruit and vegetables. Orders are taken a week in advance for bags of seasonal produce and collected the following week. Each bag costs £4.50 or a 'Healthy Start' Voucher. Refreshments are usually available, where donations are welcome but not necessary. Since the pandemic this activity has been suspended, however we are hoping to resume this activity in the near future, subject to the easing of restrictions.

Community Food Larder

Alongside our foodbank activity we operate a very popular community food larder out of our centre in Nelson. Anyone is welcome, no questions are asked, no referral is needed and there are no membership costs. We have a team of volunteers who collect surplus food from various supermarkets including Tesco, Co-op, Aldi, Greggs and Sainsburys. These items are then redistributed through the larder into the local community and also reduce food waste. Currently this activity runs Monday-Friday 9.30am-11.30am out of our hub in Nelson, and on the weekends from the porch at St John's Church. Subject to grant funding we are planning on resuming a further larder activity at our new foodhub in Treharris.



Hey Girls

We are committed to tackling period poverty through our partnership with our friends at Hey Girls. A selection of free sanitary items are available at all activities we operate.

Vodafone Buyone, Getone

We are committed to tackling digital and connection poverty through our partnership with Vodafone and the Trussell Trust. We provide a free Vodafone sim-card for 6 months of 20GB data, unlimited calls, and unlimited texts. To receive a sim-card we ask that clients are referred from a community professional or support agency who assesses the need on an individual basis. The client will need an unlocked handset or one that is already on the Vodafone network to use the simcard provided.

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Merthyr Cynon Foodbank

Merthyr Cynon Foodbank provides emergency food for people in crisis in Merthyr Tydfil and Cynon Valley (Aberdare and Mountain Ash). We have 9 distribution centres although 3 are temporarily closed at the moment.

We fed 7,192 people in crisis in the last financial year and so far over 2,900 have been fed this year.

Merthyr Cynon Foodbank is part of the Trussell Trust's UK-wide foodbank network.

All clients are referred to us by frontline care professionals. Every food item is donated by individuals, churches, organisations and schools. We were overwhelmed by the generosity of the public during the pandemic.

We have 3 PCPs (Permanent Collection Points) in 3 supermarkets (Tesco Extra in Merthyr, Tesco Superstore in Aberdare and Asda Dowlais Top) where shoppers donate weekly. So far many local schools and churches are sending their Harvest Donations. In November we will have our annual 3-day Tesco Collection in Merthyr and Aberdare. The public support is always overwhelming during this event!

We are very grateful to our communities, donors and volunteers who are very generous and supportive.

The UK government's decision to go ahead with the £20 a week cut to Universal Credit will have a huge impact on more than 6 million families and our food banks. The Chancellor should choose to protect people and keep the lifeline! Our fight continues... we believe that together we can stop hunger in the UK and the need for food banks! Merthyr Cynon Foodbank is located at the Christian Centre in Gurnos.

Fuel Bank at Citizens Advice Merthyr Tydfil



Citizens Advice Merthyr Tydfil is a registered charity who offer free, independent, confidential and impartial advice, and campaign on issues affecting peoples' lives. Our goal is to help everyone find a way forward, no matter who you are, what your situation is or what problems you may face. We value diversity, promote equality and challenge discrimination wherever we see it.

Through partnership working, we recently started running a project with Feeding Britain and the Fuel Bank Foundation to issue fuel vouchers. This is a fantastic partnership assisted by VAMT, and a brilliant resource for those in Merthyr Tydfil who are struggling. With the pandemic still affecting people's lives, cuts to Universal Credit and the increasing costs of energy bills, this is needed now more than ever. Our team of advisers are on hand to fully explore our clients' circumstances and to ensure the appropriate assistance is always offered.

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Fit and Fed Merthyr Tydfil

Fit and Fed is a school holiday program that looks to enrich the lives of the young people of Merthyr Tydfil. As well as providing free access to sports and cultural activities, the project provides a nutritious meal and snacks to fuel the children and young people for the day ahead. The project further helps young people to develop their confidence and skills through providing accredited training around sport and food, so that they can help deliver the project to their peers.

Currently, the project works with eight partners across the youth sector within Merthyr Tydfil. Since starting the project in the summer of 2018, the project has engaged with over 900 different children and young people and has provided over 2500 meals.

This summer, the project ran a beach sports festival at Aberavon Beach. Dallaglio RugbyWorks and Welsh Triathlon were invited to the day, where they provided taster sessions for the 110 young people who were there. The highlight of the day was the surfing lessons provided by Surf School Wales, where most young people learnt to ride the waves. As part of a community partnership with Tesco Merthyr Tydfil, they provided a range of fruit for healthy snacks and kept the group hydrated with donations of water.

The vision of Fit and Fed Merthyr Tydfil going forward is to expand the project to up to 14 sites across the borough. With an ambitious bid being proposed to the Big Lottery Fund, we hope to gain funding that not only extends the provision to 14 sites, but also provides a range of development opportunities for young volunteers.

Fit and Fed Merthyr Tydfil has also been shortlisted by Tesco's Merthyr Tydfil as one of their local projects to support. Between the 1st of October 2021 and the 1st of December 2021, you can vote for the project using the blue coins in store. If successful, the funding will contribute to the delivery of Fit and Fed across the borough.











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Ty Pantri

Ty Pantri is Merthyr Tydfil Housing Association's project that is committed to reducing food poverty locally. The pandemic highlighted a much-needed approach to ensure that affordable fresh produce is delivered to the community, alongside ambient foods, that will help stock the family cupboards. Therefore, Ty Pantri has combined the principles of a traditional food coop, alongside a FareShare pantry model.

Covid-19 presented many challenges for the community of Merthyr Tydfil. Being able to access affordable fresh and ambient food was one of these. With a select few supermarkets offering delivery many of which set minimum order amounts, many were left many stranded with food choices. Ty Pantri understood the fears of accessing supermarkets, the fear of using public transport, and the costs that are attributed to a supermarket delivery. As a result, we have built in a delivery service to Ty Patri. The success of this has resulted in 125 regular customers who access the fresh and ambient produce. Ty Pantri commits to supporting young families. Those who are in receipt of Healthy Start Vouchers can use these to purchase fresh fruit and vegetables and have these delivered to their doorstep.

Ty Pantri continues to develop and enhance its service. Being committed to reducing food poverty, the service also looks to educate its customer base. We have developed "how to" videos that are uploaded to YouTube so that customers can learn to cook step-by-step meals that can be made from Ty Pantri produce.

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Gellideg Foundation Group

The Gellideg Foundation Group is operating the Merthyr Tydfil Community Food Pantry from the Wellbeing Centre. It operates like a shop, members come and select their produce from us, including fruit and veg and free items.







Members come on Tuesday mornings and Thursday afternoons to select their items. We have 80 members and a growing reserve list. A bag of produce costs £3.50

The pantry has groceries and toiletries, fruit and veg are free. We are also opening a new non-members day on a Friday to increase access to the pantry.

Some products are not as popular as others, so we cook these in our kitchen and offer them to pantry members as soups or muffins, crumbles or casseroles instead.



Merthyr Tydfil County Borough Council Tenancy Hardship Fund

Welsh Government have introduced a Tenancy Hardship Grant that is designed to support people who have fallen behind on their rent by more than eight weeks between 1st March 2020 and 30th June 2021 because of the coronavirus pandemic. The grant is designed to help people stay in their homes and prevent them losing their tenancies.

The grant will be administered by the local authority and will be open to tenants who are not in receipt of housing-related benefits.

Eligibility

To apply for a Tenancy Hardship Grant, you must have had financial hardship due to the Covid-19 pandemic that meant that you have not been able to pay your rent.

You will:

- Have built up 8 weeks or more of rent arrears between 1 March 2020 and 30 June 2021
- Have struggled to pay your rent or rent arrears due to Covid-19
- Live in and hold a tenancy for a private sector property in Wales
- Not have been getting housing benefit or housing cost payments through Universal Credit when you built up your rent arrears
- Not have been able to fully pay your rent during the period when you went into arrears because of Covid-19.

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Merthyr cardboard reuse initiative gains Tesco support

ELITE Paper Solutions, an environmental social enterprise in Merthyr Tydfil, has gained support from Tesco Extra (Merthyr) with their new cardboard re-use initiative 'ECO Animal Bedding'.

The initiative began in February of this year, and involves collection of used, good quality corrugated cardboard, which is then finely shredded and bagged for reuse. This produces a low dust, highly absorbent product which not only reduces potential landfill but provides an environmentally friendly bedding for a range of animals and pets. A huge benefit of this new product is that it helps animals that suffer respiratory problems such as COPD, due to the low dust content.

ECO Animal Bedding is fully biodegradable which breaks down much quicker than traditional animal bedding, once mucked out it can then be used as an effective mulch. In addition to this, the high absorbency provides a cleaner, more comfortable environment for your animals.

Before engaging with ELITE Paper Solutions (EPS), waste cardboard from Tesco Extra (Merthyr) was sent from their store back to distribution centres in Avonmouth, Magor and Daventry, which equates to at least a 120 mile round trip. By switching to ELITE Paper Solutions, Tesco Extra have effectively reduced their carbon footprint, at one store, by approximately 10 tonnes of CO2e per annum, in terms of waste cardboard alone.





Natalie Morgan from Tesco Extra (Merthyr) said:

"As a company that prides itself on its CSR values, it's highly important that waste material are disposed of in the correct manner. As ELITE Paper Solutions are local to us, we have the reassurance that the service provider isn't travelling considerable distances to collect the waste, which helps reduce our carbon footprint."

ELITE's main charity 'ELITE Supported Employment Agency Ltd' has been assisting disabled people to obtain and maintain paid employment opportunities, within the community, via one to one support since 1994.

ELITE Paper Solutions, a not for profit Social Enterprise was launched in 2015. The nature of the business ensures that there is a job that will meet every need, irrespective of the person's disability, making it a fully inclusive workplace. The staff are of varying age, ability and equality of opportunity is a strong ethical focus. This new product will create jobs, volunteering and training opportunities, providing added benefits.

To further aid ECO Animal Bedding, ELITE Paper Solutions has been awarded grant funding from 'WRAP Cymru', which aims to support re-use, refurbishment, and re-manufacturing activities in Wales.

The funding will support ELITE Paper Solutions source and purchase new machinery, in particular a compact baler which will aid production enabling growth as the business evolves over time and saving thousands of tonnes of cardboard going to landfill.

Bishop Hedley pupils in open air projects

The return of school saw renewed interest in outdoor activities. About 52 pupils from year-11 classes attended open-air lessons and fieldwork at Nant Llwynog Park. This was a party from Bishop Hedley Catholic High School in Merthyr Tydfil, led by Head of Geography, Alex Turley.

After an introduction from the Park Friends Chairman, Edward Dawson, the troupe was split into several smaller groups. Some looked for autumnal fungi while others started litter picking. Some had a great September day observing while others worked on scrub clearance, removing saplings of Alder and Willow that are encroaching onto the grasslands. The boys and girls did a great job in opening up a large area, though there is more still to be done.

One group went off to survey the ant hills to the north. These are the visible bumps in the grass made by the Yellow Meadow ant, and many can be about 100 years old. Jim Davies led the group and gave them a talk on how these common creatures can affect the landscape. They were also amazed to find that Jim had led expeditions to Africa and South America, leading to a new species of bat being named after him. This privilege is rarer than winning the Nobel Prize!

Nant Llwynog is an old colliery site which has been expertly smoothed out and landscaped by Tom Bramley. It is good place to study nature and identify species or just to relax in and absorb the atmosphere. The wide range of wildlife present makes it worthwhile checking the plant list, which numbers over 250 kinds.



The guides were Ai-Lin Kee, expert leader, Jim Davies, local naturalist and Mark Davies from Keep Wales Tidy. The pupils had a great time; many never have visited such a site, and thought the guides were 'out of Jumanji'.

Treharris Park

The Taff Bargoed Development Trust has donated the sculpture of a dragon at Treharris Park. The sculpture is located near to the bandstand and will now help to attract additional users to the Park and help increase activity in the process.

The dragon adds to the other sculptures present that has created such an attractive experience for people to enjoy. A totem pole sculpture will also be carved shortly to further expand the Park's attraction.

I love talking to and meeting new people and it's always nice to hear another voice and chat and everyone should have the opportunity to be able to experience that.
